Later when teaching doctoral level students the ins and outs of existentially-driven communication analyses, I tested their understanding by requiring them to explain the constructs in question to an intelligent, sentient 5 year old. I challenge you to use that standard—not only for your intellectual and spiritual development, but for any who would encounter your sharing of what we know and experience about the LORD God Almighty.

³This is my favorite, and most difficult question. When teaching VBS in the late nineties, I was assigned as a helper in a class for five year olds. They ask the best questions, and this was one of my biggest challenges to explain. It is easy to explain difficult constructs to normally intelligent people; you've got a treasure trove of language and ideas from which to draw.
